He developed his own unique style of bijin-ga as well, and is said to have lead the bijin-ga trend after the artist Utamaro had passed away.

Toyokuni kept a very stoic stance with his expressions. He developed his own style, but also received a lot of influence from other artists as well, but he was skilled enough to incorporate those influences into his own art style, which goes to show how talented an artist he was.

For this month, I watched the film "Good Will Hunting."


